Bristol Zoo

After a short lunch we were just in time to watch the gorillas being fed and listen to a gorilla talk. Finally Class Three enjoyed a really fascinating Variety of Life Workshop where children had to sort animals into groups, identify the key features of each group and then got to handle cockroaches, a snake and a rat.
